CURRENT NEWS

Members' Meetings - July's meeting was attended by 20 members. Our guest speaker was Grace Couchman, speaking about Landcare and various styles of nest boxes. Next month, there will be no speaker as it's the AGM. However all other aspects of these meetings will go ahead including lunch and Show & Tell. In September, two Woodies members Syd Gordon and David Carlos will be talking about and demonstrating various jigs to be used with machines.

Current Grant Successes - We have purchased and installed our new Laguna Lathe thanks to a successful Bass Coast Shire Council Community Grant request.

First Aid Courses - As a result of another Grant allocation, 2 courses will be conducted at dates to be announced within the next couple of months. This will enable 20 Woodies members to do a specially planned Level 1 First Aid Course, to suit the Club's needs. It will include CPR and Defibrillator training. Each course will each cater for 10 participants and be a full day commitment. There will be no cost involved and lunch is included. For obvious reasons, Supervisors will be given precedence, however there should be ample opportunity for other members who regularly attend workshop sessions to be involved.

Membership News - We're still regularly welcoming new members. Our current membership stands at 98. There are also a few potential new members who have visited or requested information.

Swap, Sell, Donate Day - Lex Van Saane is organising this day on Saturday 17th August from 9 to 12pm. The "Meet" will allow members who have items (woodcraft related) to either give away, sell or swap,

to bring them along. Members are asked to clearly designate which of these categories the items fall into and if it's for sale - a price, or "offer" needs to be attached. Of course all members are encouraged to come along and check out what's available. If you wish to buy something, cash would be preferred.

The one stipulation is that any items brought along that don't change hands one way or the other, must be taken away again at the end of the session. There will be more information provided closer to the date. In the meantime, have a look through your 'stash' and see what you would like to pass on to someone else as a generous donation or to make a few bucks!

The question has been asked about larger items. If not transportable, bring along photos, manuals or the like to discuss with potential purchasers.

Cleaning up the workshops - This is getting better, but we ALL need to keep on top of it please. Don't forget sanders, chisel grinders, etc., if you use them.

Use of the Club's woodturning chisel sets - The Club provides 4 sets of chisels (6 tools in each set) for those beginning woodturning, who do not have their own tools. Each type of chisel is ground in such a way as to be ideal to learn the basic skills with. Unfortunately, it has been noticed that some of these tools have been ground to non-standard and inappropriate shapes. These sets are being used by a number of mostly new members and the set grinds MUST NOT be changed. If a member feels that they are at a stage that they wish to try a more sophisticated or 'trendy' profile, then they need to acquire and use their own chisels. If you are unsure about the acceptable profiles or sharpening in general, please speak to your Supervisor.

Bunnings Fathers' Day evening event - This will be conducted on Thursday 29th August from 6pm to 8pm. We aim to have items for sale - Club toys and items that members would like to contribute, with the usual provisions. However, as it's just 2 days before Fathers Day on Sunday 1st, we suggest anything you submit should be appropriate as a Fathers' Day gift. We would also like 3 or 4 members to supervise the stand. Further details to follow.

.. A BLAST FROM THE PAST .. MEMBER PROFILE AUGUST 2012

In the absence of any new member profiles being offered, this is one of the very first from back in 2012. I thought that it was appropriate, considering Neil is stepping down this year after 5 years as President.



NEIL LENNE

I grew up in Reservoir with my mother, father and adopted brother. I was born without a hip on my right side and spent a lot of my childhood at either the Children's Hospital in Melbourne or at Mt Martha's Children's Hospital. There they tried to stretch my right leg and stop my left leg from growing (I would have been a

lot taller under normal circumstances). When I was home, I was in plaster for lengthy periods. My father never got to see me walk unaided. He passed away of a heart attack in front of me at a scout meeting when I was 10 years old. I meet Lynn when she was 16 and I was 19, and we've been together ever since - married for 33 years. We have 2 adult children, our son Heath is 27 and has 2 children, Emily 3 and Jack 18mths. He and his partner are expecting their 3rd in September. Our daughter Elise also has 2 children, Declan 3 and Liam 18mth (I think they got together and planned it to send us broke). So by Christmas we will have 5 grandchildren!

I left school when I was 14, I missed so much schooling I just couldn't catch up and was actually asked to leave. The first job I had was electro plating and metal polishing, I was there for around 2 years. Next, I worked for a glass company in Collingwood were I learnt glazing. I was there for around 5 years. My next and last job for 20 years was for the S.E.C as a plant operator. I was finally forced to retire at 43 due to ill health. The specialist actually told me that if I didn't retire I would be in a wheel chair in 10 years. It's been 13 years now and I'm still walking, so it was obviously the right decision. It was a hard time as the kids were still in high school but we pulled together and got through.

I have been coming to Phillip Island since I was a child. My uncle had a holiday house at the Cape. We started coming down as a family over 20 years ago. We always stayed at the foreshore caravan park in San Remo. Starting with a pop-top then moving on to an on-site van. We decided many years ago that San Remo was the place we wanted to be and always told the kids that as soon as they both had a full time job and could support themselves, we were off. That is exactly what we did 7 years ago. We lived in the caravan for 12 months while the house was being built just up the road in, what we believe, is the best spot in Sany. Lynn's mum

moved with us, as she was on her own, and has a granny flat under the house. We love the peace and quiet, everything is at a much slower pace and we live a pretty quiet life, which suits us.

My father in-law had a big influence on my life. When I met Lynn, I was immediately welcomed into the family. We found out later that my mum actually worked with Lynn's dad at the carpet mill and Lynn's mum went to school with my dad – it's a small world. Dad treated me like the son he never had, taught me a lot about gardening and working out problems and he was always there for me. He passed away 16 years ago and I lost another father.

I have always loved working with wood, the feel and smell, the different types, the way it can be changed. When I retired, I did a French polishing course and have both made or repaired a lot of furniture in our house. Lynn often brings home tatty or broken pieces of furniture from the op shop and garage sales and says, "Neil can you fix it?" She thinks I can fix anything.

I love pottering around the garden and I'm a life member at the Preston Garden Club. In 2011 I received a gold medallion from the Horticultural Society for service to horticulture. I used to do a lot of lead lighting and I also love playing golf, but have not done either for some time. Unfortunately I have had to cut back a lot due to my health. It's a bugger getting old.

I enjoy the Woodies because I meet people. Lynn works and I need company. I would go mad if I didn't do anything. Woodwork is something I can do when I'm able and I have a break when I'm not.



The mitre saw is screwed to a timber table top.



MACHINE DAMAGE





Unfortunately damage has occurred to one of our machines - the Festool Kapex compound mitre saw. The left rear alloy stop has been cut through when someone carelessly cut at an angle. Thankfully, it does not seem that the blade has been damaged, however, the replacement cost of this rear stop is \$156 from Festool.

Accidental damage can occur from time to time, however when damage occurs because of carelessness or inappropriate operation of a machine <u>AND</u> is not reported, that is unacceptable.
