MEET OUR NEW PRESIDENT

As it was in 2016, when Syd Gordon wrote this Member Profile for the Woodies Newsletter.

Born in Bournemouth, England I immigrated to Australia at the age of 15 (1968) with my parents and younger brother and sister. My dad was in the R.A.F. so the family was never in one place for very long, following him around most of his 'postings' including a two year stint in Aden in the Middle East. We all loved it there and it is where I developed a passion for fishing.

Electrical Safety First

In Victoria, business and building sites cannot use <u>double</u> <u>adapters</u>. In Queensland and New South Wales, the use of double adapters is strongly discouraged due to their risk of fires and shock. Most areas in Australia will strongly not recommend the use of double adapters and ban them in larger building complexes.

They generally have no overload protection. They can overheat quickly and it's a common cause of house fires. The risk of electrical fire is further increased when you start piggy-backing or daisy-chaining to power boards or wall sockets. Double adaptors are prone to plugs falling out, especially if they are wall mounted as in Picture 1 and therefore become an electrocution hazard.

The use of a power board with overload protection, is instead recommended. Also make sure there's a safety switch on your property's electrical circuit. Keep power boards well ventilated and dust free. Standard power boards usually have a maximum capacity of 10 Amps/2400 Watts, so don't exceed this. Many woodworking tools and machines use high currents. An example at home is an Iron or a Kettle, each of which can use up to 3000 watts, so plug these directly into a wall socket.

Some power boards also incorporate surge protection against very short high voltage spikes, but these usually come at a premium price.

However, even using power boards can sometimes be problematic if they are overloaded by piggy-backing, or overloaded with larger machines/appliances - see the bottom pictures at right.

Make sure power boards meet all Australian safety standards. Some cheaper ones purchased on-line from overseas-based bulk sellers may not. Preferably only buy power boards from a genuine and well-known retailer. Price is generally a fair guide - you get what you pay for.

Woodturning Design Helper - Project Designer Helper for Woodturners -

Some members of Wonthaggi Woodies will know that I write computer software as well as turn the odd piece of wood from time-to time. Some members have used *Segmented Turning Helper* over many years now; an essential computer tool to design segmented turning projects.

Lately I have turned my attention to see if I could design general purpose software to assist all woodturners.

Over the last three months I have been slowly putting together some ideas with the aid of mathematical geometry and pasting together with computer code to produce a product that may assist any woodturner in designing their next project.

The app is named *Woodturning Design Helper* and is capable of assisting in the design of objects like bowls, goblets, table legs, boxes and many other turned objects. The app employs three curves and geometries generally seen in spindle turning, like beads, coves and fillets. With a total of only eight of these simple geometries, you can add them to the working canvas to design your next project.




Figure 1 - A goblet designed using 2 curves, a fillet and a bead.

Because there are only eight geometries to deal with, using the app is extremely simple. For example, simply click a button to add a cove, say, to the working canvas and as you position the item or resize it, its 3-dimensional (3D) representation is drawn in the adjacent canvas. The 3D object literally grows before your eyes, thanks to the power of computers.


Figure 1 above shows the design of a goblet put together using two curves, a fillet and a bead.




Below: This table and magazine rack combination was made from plywood by David Carlos. The complicated process included making a form to bend the shape around and is an excellent outcome for a first effort.


THAT'S NOT MY JOB!

This is a story about four people named: Everybody, Somebody, Anybody and Nobody. There was an important job to be done and Everybody was sure that Somebody would do it. Anybody could have done it, but Nobody did it. Somebody got angry about that, because it was Everybody's job. Everybody thought Anybody could do it, but Nobody realised that Everybody wouldn't do it. It ended up that Everybody blamed Somebody when Nobody did what Anybody could have done.



I'm sure Woodies members are aware that we have just purchased and installed a new SawStop table saw. This goes with the SawStop we already have. Although they are different models, the technology is the same.

BUT, how many of you know the workings of SawStop machines - why are they considered so safe? How do they work? What are the positives and the downsides of these machines? Well, here are some answers





So, how does it work? The blade in a SawStop table saw carries a small electrical signal. The human body, and therefore your skin, is conductive. When the skin on your finger, hand, or arm comes into contact with the blade, the change in electrical signal activates the safety system. An aluminium brake springs into the path of the blade which comes to a complete stop, the power to the motor is shut off and the blade's angular momentum drives it

below the table, removing the risk of subsequent contact all in less than 5 milliseconds!

Although table saws equipped with the SawStop sensing system effectively limit the severity of injury to minor cuts and nicks, the potential for serious lacerations is still there. This can be exacerbated by the amount of force towards the blade or the safety mechanism having accidently been de-activated, or wearing gloves - a real no-no!! Also when using a SawStop, the sensing does not stop kickback! Table saws are widely considered the most dangerous power tool, with about 30,000 blade-contact injuries requiring medical treatment each year in the United States.

Blade contact with other conductors - wet wood, metals (jig, guard or similar), will also activate the mechanism.

This can be costly, as both the cartridge and blade (which will also be damaged) need to be replaced. A new 10" blade costs b/n \$100 and \$200, depending on brand and teeth count. The cost of replacing a SawStop cartridge mechanism is \$160.

SawStop machines are also substantially more expensive to purchase initially.

THE COST OF A SAWSTOP IN OZ is from \$1549 to \$9305

Since SawStop came onto the market in 2004, tens of thousands of the company's table saws have been sold.

The US Federal Consumer Product Safety Commission appears poised to mandate a SawStop-type safety brake on all new table saws sold in the USA. This would effectively snowball to similar regulations world-wide, meaning standard table saws could not be sold.

Manufacturers have consistently fought this new rule, saying it would raise the price of table saws for consumers. However, safety advocates liken it to air bags in cars and argue that the benefits outweigh costs.

Don't take tools for granted. This English style HSS skew chisel (oval cross section) snapped in use. By nature, this chisel style has much thinner and lightweight steel compared with a rectangular skew. However, when checked closely it was clear that there had been a flaw in manufacture at the point circled above, indicated by the internal colour & texture of the steel at that point. This tool was not branded. Advice - if possible, buy a quality solid rectangular section skew, and it is unlikely to fail you.
